INTRODUCTION



The Iraqi-Korean Business Council was formed pursuant to Law No. (43) of 1989 (as amended) of the Federation of Iraqi Chambers of Commerce (FICC), and pursuant to Ministerial Order No. 1192, No. 3483, dated February 12, 2024, and its appendix, Ministerial Order No. 167, No. 533, dated January 8, 2025, issued by the Government of the Republic of Iraq/Ministry of Trade. It is an official economic entity within the official organisational structure and in accordance with applicable economic legislation. The Council operates within the institutional framework of the Federation of Iraqi Chambers of Commerce and under the direct supervision of the Ministry of Trade. Its goal is to develop economic, trade, and investment relations between the Republic of Iraq and South Korea, thereby strengthening cooperation between the private and public sectors of both countries.

The Iraqi-Korean Business Council aims to strengthen economic relations and facilitate commercial cooperation between Iraq and Korea, and to assist companies from both countries in accessing each other's markets. Additionally, the Council promotes cultural, artistic, sporting, and language exchanges to foster mutual understanding and collaboration. The Iraqi-Korean Business Council actively promotes key sectors, including construction, oil and gas, energy, education, maritime industries, shipbuilding, Healthcare and Defence, among others. The purpose of the Iraq-Korea Business Council is to strengthen bilateral relations between the public and private sectors of both countries. The Council supports companies from both sides seeking to operate in various industries, promotes human capacity development through education and vocational training, and organises specialised and commercial exhibitions.



STRATEGY GOALS

- **Strengthen economic and commercial cooperation between Iraq and Korea**

The Council seeks to deepen bilateral trade relations by identifying strategic areas of mutual interest, facilitating dialogue between key stakeholders, and creating platforms for knowledge exchange and joint planning. Through collaborative initiatives, policy alignment, and the removal of trade barriers, the Council aims to enhance the volume and quality of economic exchange between the two nations.

- **Encourage Korean investment in Iraq**

The Council proactively promotes Iraq as a viable and attractive destination for Korean investors by showcasing opportunities across sectors, including energy, infrastructure, agriculture, technology, and manufacturing. It supports potential investors with relevant information, legal guidance, and networking channels to ensure informed decision-making and successful project implementation.

- **Organise joint events and exhibitions**

To build visibility and foster collaboration, the Council facilitates a range of joint activities, including trade fairs, industry-specific expos, business forums, and innovation showcases. These events serve as valuable platforms for companies, entrepreneurs, and institutions from both countries to explore partnerships, present solutions, and expand their market reach.

- **Build partnerships between the public and private sectors in both countries**

The Council promotes synergy between government bodies and private enterprises in Iraq and Korea by encouraging public-private partnerships (PPPs), co-developing initiatives, and fostering policy environments that support sustainable collaboration. These partnerships aim to bridge gaps, accelerate development goals, and generate long-term economic impact for both nations.

The Council will also play a key role in implementing future bilateral agreements, developing the tourism sector, and creating a supportive environment for investors and business leaders. Additionally, the Council engages with public and private institutions to identify and promote investment opportunities in Iraq and Korea.

Strategic Gateway for Trade with Asia

Export Opportunities from Iraq to the Republic of Korea

The Republic of Iraq enjoys a strategic geographical location that serves as a natural bridge connecting the Middle East with Asia and Europe. This unique position gives Iraq a pivotal role in regional and international trade flows. As Iraq accelerates economic reconstruction and diversifies its sources of national income, the export sector is a key driver of trade with international partners, including the Republic of Korea.

South Korea is one of the world's leading industrial economies, possessing a highly advanced technological and industrial base. This makes it a natural partner for Iraq in establishing balanced and sustainable trade relations. At the same time, Iraq possesses abundant natural, agricultural, and industrial resources that offer significant opportunities to expand bilateral trade and increase Iraqi exports to the Korean market.

Economic relations between Iraq and South Korea have witnessed notable growth in recent years. Korean companies have participated in several strategic projects in Iraq, particularly in energy, infrastructure, and industrial development. Meanwhile, the Korean market offers promising opportunities for Iraqi products known for their diversity, quality, and competitive potential in global markets.

By strengthening trade cooperation channels with Korea, Iraq can become a significant supplier of raw materials and products required by Korean industries. At the same time, Iraqi companies can benefit from Korea's advanced technological expertise to improve production standards, enhance quality, and increase the competitiveness of Iraqi exports.

Developing Iraq's export sector also represents an important step toward economic diversification and reducing dependence on oil revenues. The Iraqi government, in cooperation with economic institutions and the private sector, is working to support domestic industries, improve the business environment, and open international markets for Iraqi products.



The Iraq-Korea Business Council (IKBC) plays a vital role in supporting these efforts by building bridges of cooperation between the business communities of both countries, facilitating communication between Iraqi and Korean companies, and opening new channels for trade and investment. These efforts help establish long-term economic partnerships that benefit both nations.

Expanding Iraqi exports to the Korean market not only generates economic gains but also strengthens bilateral relations between Iraq and South Korea on economic, cultural, and technological levels—supporting sustainable development and creating new opportunities for growth and innovation.

Promising Iraqi Sectors for Export to South Korea

Iraq possesses a diversified economic base that offers significant opportunities to expand exports to international markets, including the South Korean market, which is characterised by strong demand and diverse needs across the industrial and food sectors. These opportunities span several key economic sectors and can help expand trade cooperation between the Republic of Iraq and the Republic of Korea.

Several key sectors stand out as central pillars for this cooperation, most notably the agricultural and food sector, the industrial and manufacturing sector, the energy and natural resources sector, as well as industrial and technological partnerships, all of which open new horizons for trade, investment, and economic collaboration between the two countries.

Iraq as a Strategic Partner for South Korea in Trade and Investment

Amid the rapid transformations in the global economy, major industrial nations are seeking to diversify their import sources and strengthen trade partnerships with emerging markets with strong economic potential. In this context, Iraq stands out as one of the most promising markets in the Middle East, thanks to its abundant natural resources, strategic geographic location, and growing economic opportunities.



Export Opportunities from Iraq to the Republic of Korea

The Republic of Iraq represents an important economic partner for the Republic of Korea—not only as a source of energy and natural resources, but also as an emerging market with significant potential in agriculture, industry, and services. With the acceleration of economic reforms and increasing openness to international markets, Iraq’s investment environment has become more attractive to international companies and investors.

Iraq enjoys a strategic geographic location connecting Asian and European markets, making it a natural gateway to the region's hundreds of millions of consumers. Iraq has significant oil and gas reserves and a range of natural and agricultural resources, which form a strong foundation for global industries and offer opportunities for long-term economic cooperation with industrial nations, including the Republic of Korea.

At the same time, the Iraqi market is experiencing growing demand for products and services, driven by expanding economic activity and ongoing infrastructure reconstruction. This growth creates significant opportunities for Korean companies to expand their presence in Iraq, while also opening doors for Iraqi products to enter Asian markets.

This economic complementarity further strengthens prospects for industrial and technological partnerships between the two countries. South Korea possesses advanced expertise in industry and technology, while Iraq offers extensive resources and economic potential that can support the development of local industries, facilitate technology transfer, and promote joint production initiatives.

Within this framework, the Iraq–Korea Business Council (IKBC) serves as an institutional platform for enhancing trade and investment cooperation between the two countries. The Council facilitates communication between businesses and economic institutions, organises economic meetings, trade exhibitions, and investment missions, and provides advisory and institutional support for companies seeking to enter either the Iraqi or Korean markets.

Expanding Iraqi exports to South Korea represents a strategic step toward building a comprehensive economic partnership based on mutual interests and long-term cooperation. The Iraq–Korea Business Council aspires to serve as an effective bridge connecting the business communities of both countries and opening new horizons for trade and investment, thereby contributing to Iraq’s economic development and strengthening South Korea’s presence in one of the most promising markets in the region.



IKBC AT KOREA EMBASSY BAGHDAD



On Tuesday, 5 August 2025, His Excellency the Ambassador of the Republic of Korea in Baghdad, Mr. Lee Junil, met with the Chairman of the Iraq-Korea Business Council in an official meeting held at the Embassy. The meeting was attended by a representative from the Iraqi Ministry of Trade's Department of Economic Relations and officials from the Korean diplomatic mission.

The discussion took place within the framework of the strong bilateral relations between the two countries and as part of a series of joint meetings and activities aimed at boosting economic cooperation between Iraq and the Republic of Korea.

Both parties explored ways to enhance economic and trade collaboration, with a focus on investment opportunities across various sectors. They also examined mechanisms to support Korean companies interested in operating in Iraq and to strengthen partnerships with the Iraqi private sector.



The Council operates within the institutional framework of the Iraqi Federation of Chambers of Commerce and is directly supervised by the Ministry of Trade. It aims to develop economic, trade, and investment relations between the Republic of Iraq and the Republic of Korea, and to strengthen and support cooperation between the public and private sectors of both countries, to promote trade, investment, and the exchange of opportunities.

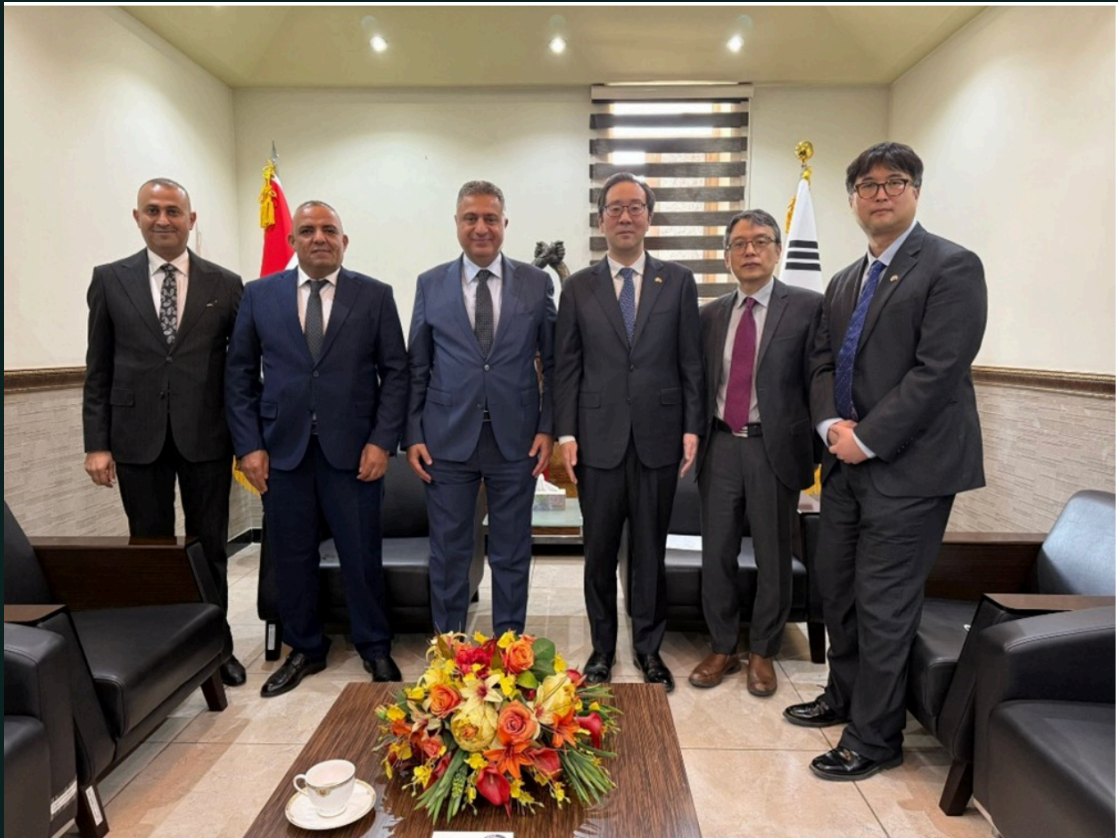
Mr. Ahmed Shaban, Chairman of the Iraq–Korea Business Council, presented an overview of the Council’s history, noting that it was established with the support of the Iraqi Federation of Chambers of Commerce in Baghdad and under a ministerial order issued by the Ministry of Trade. He mentioned that specialised committees have been formed within the Council to categorise commercial activities, including health, industry, investment, finance and banking, telecommunications, and cybersecurity, among others. He also noted that the Council’s interests extend beyond trade to include other areas, such as culture, the arts, and language, and highlighted strong Iraqi public interest in various Korean cultural events.

The Chairman also reviewed the Council’s commercial relations with Korean companies, noting that cooperation has been ongoing since 2010, particularly in shipbuilding, with more than 10 ships built in various Korean cities. He further highlighted partnerships with the Iraqi government, including the establishment of a boat manufacturing plant in Baghdad in cooperation with the Iraqi Military Industrialisation Authority, as well as projects for the Ministry of Oil, the Basra Oil Company, the General Company for Ports of Iraq, and the Ministry of Transport.

He pointed to ongoing communication with Korean companies across various sectors. He announced that the Council will participate in a specialised exhibition in Busan dedicated to shipbuilding and marine equipment in October.

The exhibition will focus on the future of the maritime industry, green innovation, and digital transformation. Several Korean governmental and industrial bodies, including the Ministry of Trade, Industry, and Energy of the Republic of Korea, will organise it. We will hold numerous meetings with Korean companies to encourage their participation and investment in the Iraqi market, with the Iraq–Korea Business Council as our primary supporter.

We are also preparing to sign memorandums of understanding with the Korean side during the October visit to Korea for companies interested in joining the Iraq–Korea Business Council. The Council will support companies and sectors investing in Iraq across various fields and levels of assistance.



Dr. Oday Mohammed, representative of the Ministry of Trade – Department of External Economic Relations, who will soon assume the position of Commercial Attache at the Embassy of Iraq in Seoul, presented several proposals aimed at enhancing trade and cultural cooperation between Iraq and the Republic of Korea.

The Korean Ambassador reaffirmed his country’s commitment to strengthening relations with Iraq and praised the Business Council's role in opening new channels of cooperation. In turn, the Chairman of the Iraq-Korea Business Council expressed his appreciation for Korea’s supportive stance toward Iraq and his aspiration to elevate economic relations.

From the Korean side, the meeting was attended by Mr. Kim Young Jae, Deputy Head of Mission, and Mr. Dong-Joon Cho, Commercial Attaché at the Embassy of the Republic of Korea.



IKBC MEMBERS FIRST MEETING

The Iraq-Korea Business Council held its inaugural session on May 13, 2025, marking a significant step toward strengthening economic cooperation between Iraq and Korea. During the first meeting, the members engaged in comprehensive discussions on adopting the Council's internal regulations, which will serve as the foundational framework for the Council's operations, management, and decision-making.

In his opening remarks, Mr Ahmed Shaban, Chairman of the Iraq-Korea Business Council, emphasised the importance of this historic initiative, which reflects Iraq's strategic direction in fostering balanced economic partnerships with friendly nations. He highlighted that the Council would serve as an effective platform to enhance economic dialogue and exchange expertise among business leaders from both countries.

The session also saw the formation of specialised committees to address key sectors and strategic areas of bilateral cooperation, including trade, investment, education, technology, energy, and cultural exchange. These committees will lead the development and implementation of sector-specific initiatives aligned with the Council's mission.





Mr. Ahmed Shaban, Chairman of the Council, noted that the establishment of this committee represents a qualitative leap in managing cooperation between Iraq and Korea, enabling a participatory approach to identifying challenges and developing solutions grounded in realistic priorities aligned with the national goals of both countries.

In addition, the participants reviewed and approved an initial action plan outlining short- and medium-term objectives, including mechanisms for engaging relevant stakeholders from both the public and private sectors. The session also discussed the development of cooperation programs in innovation and technology transfer to promote sustainable economic growth and strengthen institutional capacities in both nations.

In conclusion, Mr. Ahmed Shaban expressed optimism about the partnership's promising future, calling for joint efforts and intensified collaboration to achieve tangible results that serve the economic and developmental interests of both Iraq and Korea.





IKBC MEMBERS SECOND MEETING

The Iraq-Korea Business Council held its second session on September 29, 2025, at the Council's headquarters in Baghdad, chaired by Mr. Ahmed Shaban, Council President, with the attendance of Council members, Dr. Uday Mohammed, Commercial Attaché at the Iraqi Embassy in Seoul, representatives of the Council's office in Korea, and Dr. Raed Nizar, Advisor to the Federation of Iraqi Chambers of Commerce.

The session focused on reviewing the outcomes of the first meeting, discussing the meeting between the Council President and the Korean Ambassador in Baghdad on August 5, 2025, and revising the composition of the Council's committees and defining their tasks to facilitate the work of members between the two countries, along with appointing committee representatives and secretaries.





The Council also discussed the challenges facing companies and traders in Iraq and Korea, including customs and logistical procedures, licensing, and investment difficulties, emphasising the importance of establishing a unified informational platform linking trade between the two countries, similar to the “Teradix” platform, to facilitate import and export operations.

During the session, the Council also expanded its membership to include prominent figures from the financial and banking, healthcare, youth, and sports sectors to enhance private-sector participation in strengthening economic cooperation between Iraq and South Korea.

The Council agreed to receive a list of economic and trade exhibitions and conferences held in Korea in 2026 and to facilitate Iraqi companies’ participation in these events. In addition, coordination with the Korean Embassy in Baghdad and representatives of KOICA and KOTRA was discussed to sign memoranda of understanding and cooperation agreements, as well as to collaborate with the Iraqi Federation of Industries to identify industrial products suitable for display at Korean exhibitions.



FOREIGN MINISTRY AFFAIRS

The Iraq-Korea Business Council actively participated in the preparatory meetings for the 10th session of the Iraq-Korea Joint Committee, held on Wednesday, July 23, 2025, at the Iraqi Ministry of Foreign Affairs headquarters in Baghdad.

The meeting brought together high-level representatives from key Iraqi government ministries, the Federation of Iraqi Chambers of Commerce, the Federation of Iraqi Industries, and other relevant institutions and stakeholders, reflecting a comprehensive approach to bilateral coordination.



The preparatory session was chaired by Ambassador Shorsh Khalid Saeed, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs for Multilateral and Legal Affairs, who emphasised the strategic importance of strengthening the Iraq-Korea partnership through practical and long-term cooperation mechanisms.

In his opening remarks, Ambassador Shorsh highlighted the value of leveraging Korea's advanced capabilities across renewable energy, artificial intelligence, cybersecurity, industrial automation, telecommunications, and education. He also mentioned the need for Iraq to draw on Korea's successful development model and technological innovation to support its modernisation efforts across various sectors.



In his intervention during the session, Mr. Ahmed Shaban, Chairman of the Iraq-Korea Business Council, underscored the pivotal role that the economic partnership between Iraq and Korea can play in achieving sustainable development. He noted that the private sector must be an active partner in implementing the shared economic visions of both countries. He further emphasised the importance of establishing permanent communication channels between Korean and Iraqi investors to remove obstacles and stimulate joint ventures.

The Council's participation in these discussions reaffirmed its growing role as a key driver in facilitating dialogue between the public and private sectors, enhancing investment opportunities, and shaping the future framework for bilateral trade, industrial cooperation, and cultural exchange. The Council reaffirmed its commitment to supporting Iraq's integration into global markets and strengthening productive partnerships with Korean companies and institutions.

After the session, Mr. Ahmed Shaban highlighted that the Iraq-Korea Business Council continues to develop a practical roadmap to boost economic relations between Iraq and Korea. This includes concrete initiatives, follow-up on existing and previous agreements, and the development of new contracts. Mr Shaban emphasised the importance of ongoing coordination with both government entities and the private sector to achieve realistic, effective outcomes that serve the mutual interests of both nations and contribute to sustainable development.



Ambassador Shorsh Khalid Saeed, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs for Multilateral and Legal Affairs, emphasised the strategic importance of leveraging Korea's advanced expertise and experience across a range of vital sectors. He highlighted that Korea's global leadership in energy, renewable energy, artificial intelligence, cybersecurity, automation, and telecommunications represents a valuable opportunity for Iraq to accelerate its economic transformation and modernisation.

Additionally, he highlighted the potential for collaboration across industry, education, culture, and technological innovation, which can play a crucial role in enhancing Iraq's institutional capacity and competitiveness on the international stage.



The Ambassador further commended the establishment of the Iraqi-Korean Business Council, calling it a pivotal milestone in bilateral relations. He noted that the Council serves as a practical mechanism to foster deeper economic ties, facilitate trade and investment, and create a structured framework for public-private partnerships between Iraqi and Korean stakeholders.

The Council, he added, reflects a shared commitment by both nations to expand cooperation not only in commerce but also in cultural and knowledge exchange, paving the way for a more dynamic and mutually beneficial partnership.



KOREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY

On September 18, 2025, a delegation consisting of the commercial attaché of the Embassy of the Republic of Iraq in Korea and a representative of the Iraq-Korea Business Council (IKBC) visited the Korea Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI) in Seoul. The International Trade Division of KCCI warmly welcomed the delegation, and the meeting was held in a cordial, constructive atmosphere, reflecting the strong interest in deepening economic and business cooperation.



The IKBC delegation underscored the Council's commitment to serving as a vital bridge between Iraq and Korea and highlighted the many opportunities in Iraq's rapidly developing economy. In addition to highlighting investment opportunities, the delegation emphasised the need to introduce a wide range of high-quality Iraqi products into the Korean market, thereby diversifying trade flows and creating new avenues for business. Particular emphasis was also placed on the role of small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) in advancing growth and diversification, as well as on the potential for Korean companies to contribute their expertise across a wide range of sectors.

KCCI welcomed the Delegation and engaged in a productive exchange of views on expanding collaboration, encouraging investment, and facilitating stronger business linkage. Both sides reaffirmed their shared vision of fostering a long-term partnership that supports mutual growth and creates new opportunities for trade and cooperation.

This visit marked an important milestone in IKBC's efforts to build lasting connections with leading Korean institutions and to position the Council as a key driver of economic collaboration between the two countries.

GLOBAL BUSINESS ALLIANCE

On September 29th, 2025, the newly appointed Commercial Attaché at the Embassy of Iraq in Seoul, Dr Odey, together with Mr Ali Nawab, a committee member of the Iraq–Korea Business Council (IKBC), visited the office of the Global Business Alliance (GBA) Korea in Seoul. They were warmly received by Mr Oh Sinan, Chairman of GBA Korea and Honorary Mayor of Seoul for Tourism.

The Global Business Alliance (GBA) Korea is a leading international business platform that brings together entrepreneurs, diplomats, trade representatives, and business leaders from more than 65 countries. GBA fosters cooperation, networking, and partnerships to support international trade and sustainable business growth.



During the meeting, both sides engaged in a productive discussion on promoting trade activities and exploring new avenues of cooperation. It was highlighted that GBA and IKBC share a common mission to support small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), and both parties expressed strong interest in strengthening trade ties between Iraq and Korea.

In addition to business collaboration, the discussion emphasised the value of cultural exchange and experiential cooperation. GBA highlighted the importance of partnering with the Embassy of Iraq in Seoul and the Iraq–Korea Business Council (IKBC) not only to introduce Korean products to the Iraqi market and Iraqi products to the Korean market, but also to expand medical tourism opportunities to Korea.

Both sides agreed that these initiatives would deepen mutual understanding, strengthen economic ties, and create meaningful people-to-people connections between the two countries. Looking ahead, IKBC intends to collaborate closely with organisations such as GBA Korea to support Iraqi traders in Korea, helping them access new opportunities, expand their networks, and strengthen their business presence in the Korean market.

KORMARINE 2025



The Iraq-Korea Business Council (IKBC) reaffirmed its commitment to advancing Iraq-Korea economic relations through its support of Al Zaman Group’s (AZG) participation in KORMARINE 2025, held in Busan, South Korea. The event marked another step in IKBC’s efforts to strengthen industrial partnerships and open new channels for collaboration between the two countries.

IKBC played its role in facilitating Iraqi participation in this prestigious exhibition, which brings together global leaders in shipbuilding, marine engineering, and maritime technology. Through these efforts, AZG became the sole representative of Iraq at KORMARINE 2025 – an important symbol of the Iraqi private sector’s growing engagement in international industrial platforms.

This milestone demonstrates how coordinated efforts between business councils, trade institutions, and private companies can yield tangible outcomes that benefit both economies.



As an organisation operating under the Federation of Iraqi Chambers of Commerce (FICC), IKBC continues to serve as a vital bridge between Iraq’s private sector and Korea’s industrial and investment communities. The Council’s mission is to facilitate partnerships, promote mutual understanding, and support the transfer of knowledge and technology that contributes to Iraq’s industrial growth.

IKBC takes pride in its role in enabling this success at KORMARINE 2025 and remains committed to creating further opportunities for collaboration between Iraqi and Korean enterprises – building a stronger, more connected future for both nations.

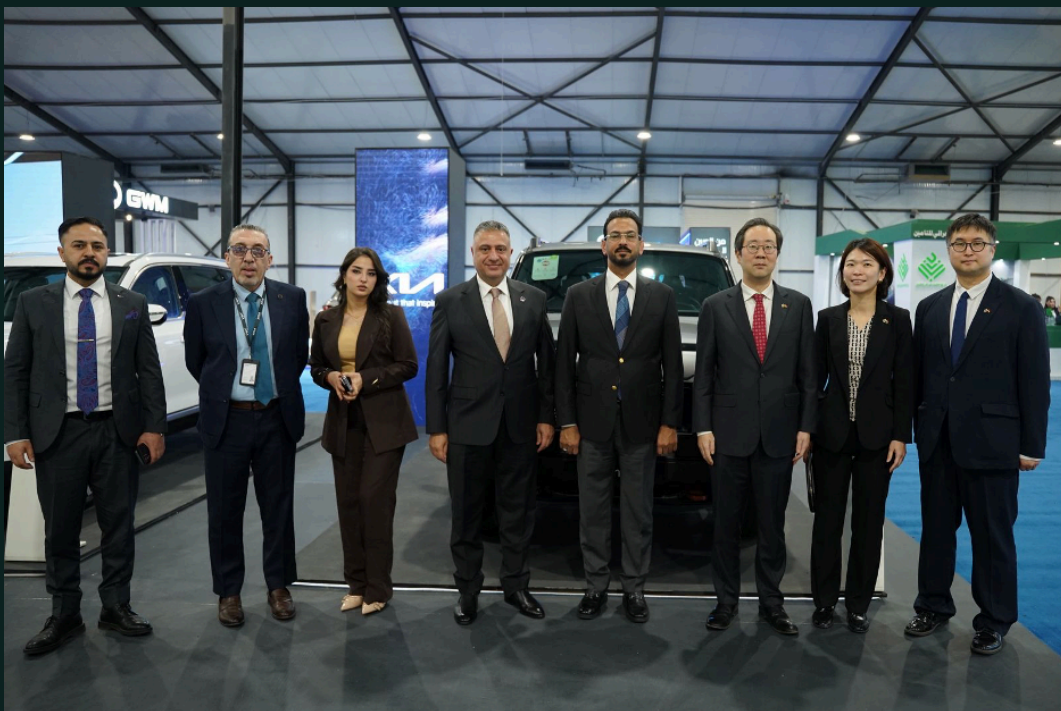
IKBC is the Gold Sponsor of the International Business Forum

The chairman of the council maintained an active presence in the official delegation, reaffirming the Iraqi-Korean Business Council’s role in supporting bilateral cooperation and expanding the horizons of economic partnership between Baghdad and Seoul. Following the opening ceremony, the Korean Ambassador, the First Secretary, and the Commercial Attaché, accompanied by the Chairman of the Iraqi-Korean Business Council, paid an official visit to the pavilion of Kia International, one of the leading Korean companies participating in this edition, to review the company’s latest products and technologies in the automotive sector and related services.

The International Business Forum included a number of specialised bilateral meetings that reflected the diversity of international interest in the Iraqi market. The International Business Forum – The Premier Economic Event of the 49th Edition

The Private Sector Development Department at the Iraqi Ministry of Trade supports economic development and strengthens the private sector as a key driver of the national economy. The department works to develop policies and programs to empower Iraqi companies and expand their presence in regional and international markets, while also supporting initiatives that improve the investment environment and encourage economic partnerships with countries worldwide. This role aligns with the Iraqi government's broader vision to diversify the economy, promote trade openness, and enhance Iraq's integration into the global economy.

In this context, the Private Sector Development Department at the Ministry of Trade continues its institutional efforts to support the private sector and strengthen mechanisms of cooperation between government institutions and the business community. These efforts contribute to enhancing Iraq's economic standing and opening new avenues for trade and investment cooperation. The department's initiatives have also helped build strategic partnerships with several international institutions and business councils, thereby strengthening communication between the public and private sectors and supporting joint investment projects.

The Baghdad International Fair included a series of international economic forums held on the sidelines of the exhibition. These forums served as important platforms for economic dialogue and the exchange of perspectives among representatives of governments and business communities from participating countries. In this context, the Private Sector Development Department at the Ministry of Trade had a prominent and active presence in these forums, where Mr. Malik Khalaf, Director General of the Department, participated in their sessions representing the Ministry of Trade.



During these engagements, he delivered official remarks outlining the government’s vision for supporting the private sector, improving the investment environment, and encouraging international economic partnerships. This participation helped highlight the Ministry of Trade’s institutional role in supporting international economic dialogue and strengthening Iraq’s presence on global economic platforms.

Within this institutional framework, cooperation with the Iraq-Korea Business Council (IKBC) has emerged as an important pathway for strengthening economic relations between the Republic of Iraq and the Republic of Korea. In coordination with the Ministry of Trade and the Private Sector Development Department, the Council works to build bridges between the business communities of both countries, facilitate economic engagements, and support joint trade and investment initiatives. This collaboration represents an effective model of partnership between government institutions and international business councils to promote economic development and expand investment and trade opportunities.

Bilateral Business Meetings (B2B) to Strengthen Partnership with the Korean Side

On the sidelines of the International Business Forum, an extensive series of direct bilateral business meetings (B2B) was held, with the Council's Chairman in attendance, as part of ongoing efforts to translate the Forum's outcomes into tangible cooperation and investment opportunities and to further strengthen economic partnerships with the Korean side.

These meetings focused on exploring opportunities for investment and trade cooperation with several relevant economic and financial institutions. Among them was a meeting with Ms Katerina Hansen, Representative of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD) in Iraq, during which discussions focused on opportunities to support productive investment projects and on mechanisms to leverage the Bank's financial instruments to strengthen the private sector, particularly joint ventures.

The meetings also included discussions with representatives of the International Finance Corporation (IFC), during which opportunities for cooperation were reviewed in the areas of project financing, private-sector development, improving the investment climate, and providing technical and financial advisory services for economically viable projects, aligned with Iraq's sustainable development priorities.



On the fifth day of the International Business Forum, Mr Ahmed Shaban met with the Korean Commercial Attaché, Mr Dong Jun Jo, as well as representatives of several diplomatic missions. The discussions focused on strengthening institutional support for Korean companies seeking to invest in or expand their operations within Iraq, and on facilitating communication between Korean firms and relevant Iraqi government entities. These efforts aim to remove obstacles, enhance coordination, and reinforce mutual confidence between the two sides.





Meeting with the National U.S.–Arab Chamber of Commerce (NUSACC)

Mr Ahmed Shaban, Chairman of the Iraqi–Korean Business Council (IKBC), and Mr Ali Alqwaizi met with Mr David Hamod, President and CEO of the National U.S.–Arab Chamber of Commerce (NUSACC).

During the meeting, Mr Shaban outlined the role of IKBC as a strategic business council in Iraq dedicated to supporting the development of the business sector and advancing broader industrial cooperation initiatives. He also presented the Council’s vision for driving qualitative transformation across key economic sectors through international partnerships, technology transfer, and structured investment frameworks.

For his part, Mr Hamod expressed strong admiration for the Council’s strategic direction and reaffirmed his full support for strengthening future cooperation. He further conveyed his willingness to facilitate engagement with U.S.–Arab chambers, American industry networks, and relevant institutional stakeholders, thereby enhancing bilateral commercial relations and expanding joint cooperation opportunities.



Direct Government-to-Business Sessions (B2G) to Strengthen Institutional Cooperation

In addition to bilateral business meetings (B2B), the International Business Forum featured several direct Government-to-Business (B2G) sessions to enhance institutional communication between private-sector representatives and relevant Iraqi government entities. These sessions sought to address regulatory challenges and create a more enabling environment for investment and trade.

The sessions included direct meetings with several senior government officials, among them Dr. Thamer Qasim Dawood, Director General of the Iraqi General Customs Authority, and Mr. Tharwat Akram, Deputy Director General of the Department of Foreign Economic Relations at the Ministry of Trade. The meetings were also attended by Mr. Abdul Razzaq Al-Zuhairi, President of the Federation of Iraqi Chambers of Commerce.

Discussions focused on streamlining customs procedures, facilitating smoother trade flows, and supporting Korean companies' entry into the Iraqi market through clearer, more flexible regulatory frameworks.

The meetings further emphasised the importance of direct coordination between government entities and the private sector to address procedural obstacles, enhance transparency, and develop effective mechanisms for joint action, in line with the Iraqi government's plans to improve the business environment and attract high-quality foreign investment.



Media Engagement and Public Outreach

As part of efforts to strengthen media presence and raise awareness of the Council's role and activities, the Chairman of the Iraqi-Korean Business Council gave a televised interview on the sidelines of the International Business Forum held during the 49th Baghdad International Fair. During the interview, he outlined the Council's vision, strategic objectives, and its role in supporting the economic partnership between the Republic of Iraq and the Republic of Korea.

In his remarks, Mr Shaban elaborated on the nature of the Iraqi-Korean Business Council's work as an effective institutional platform linking the Iraqi private sector with its Korean counterpart. 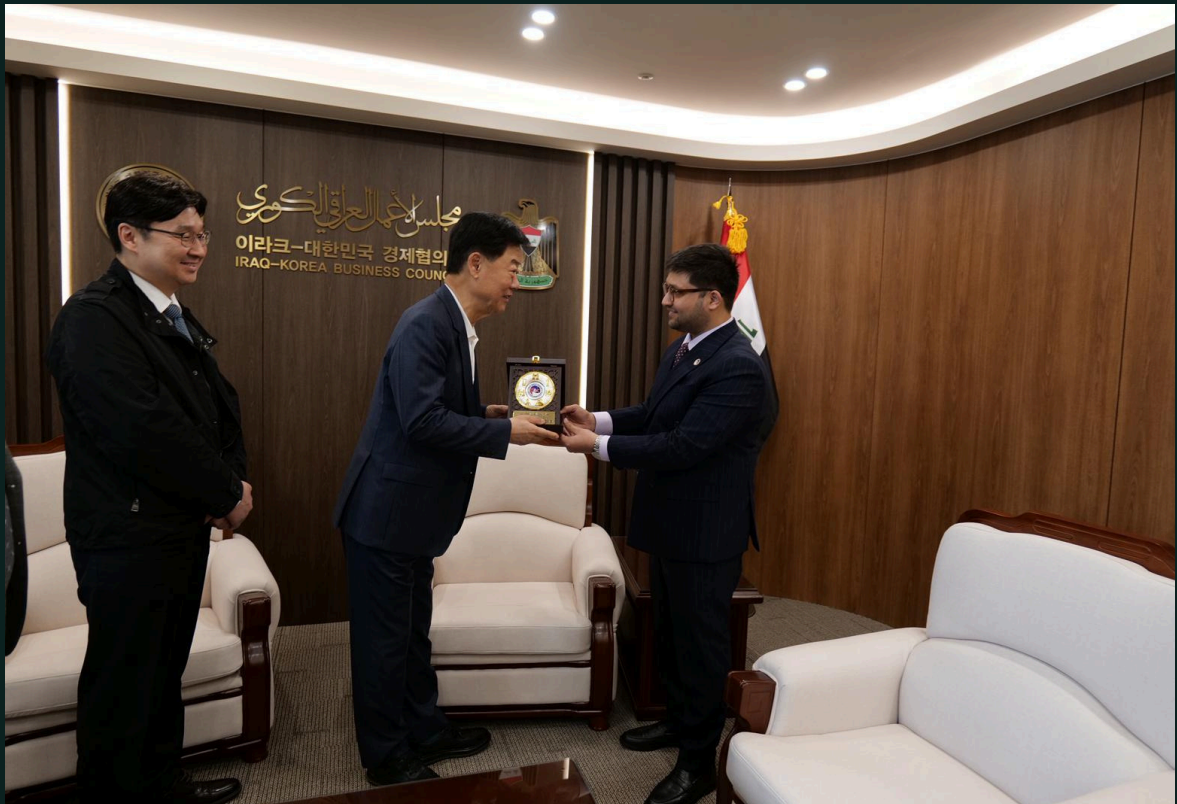

In addition, both sides discussed preparing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to establish a formal framework for future cooperation and a long-term partnership between IKBC and RX K Fairs.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Mr. Ali Nawab presented a traditional Iraqi plaque on behalf of the Chairman of IKBC to Mr. S.K. Hong as a gesture reflecting the friendly relations and growing cooperation between the two sides.



The meeting concluded with both parties expressing their interest in continuing discussions and expanding cooperation in future trade, exhibition, and business development initiatives between Iraq and Korea.



IKBC Private Sector Development Council Meeting

The Iraq-Korea Business Council participated in the meeting of the Private Sector Development Council, held at the Council's headquarters within the Iraqi Ministry of Planning in Baghdad on April 28, 2026, with high-level official attendance from both the Iraqi and Korean sides.

The meeting was chaired from the Iraqi side by Mr. Abdullah Al-Jubouri, Deputy Chairman of the Private Sector Development Council, with the participation of members of the Council's administrative and general bodies. The Iraq-Korea Business Council was represented by its Chairman, Mr. Ahmed Shaban.

From the Korean side, H.E. the Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to Iraq, Mr. Lee Junil, attended the meeting, accompanied by First Secretary Ms. Choi Shin-Hye, Commercial Attaché Mr. Dong Joon Cho, and an official delegation, underscoring the importance of this meeting in strengthening bilateral relations between the two countries.



The meeting discussed prospects for economic and trade cooperation between Iraq and the Republic of Korea, focusing on developing strategic partnerships, supporting the investment environment, and opening new avenues for cooperation across key sectors.



The Private Sector Development Council in Iraq is a high-level national body dedicated to strengthening the private sector's role and enabling it to serve as a key partner in economic development. The Council comprises leading business figures alongside representatives from relevant government entities, including economic ministries, investment bodies, and financial institutions. It helps shape policies and directions to improve Iraq's business environment by proposing economic reforms, addressing private-sector challenges, and supporting the modernisation of legislation and regulatory frameworks to meet market needs.

The Council also seeks to enhance public-private partnerships, promote both domestic and foreign investment, and diversify national income sources beyond oil dependency. Furthermore, it plays a key coordinating role in supporting economic initiatives, promoting trade, and expanding cooperation with international partners, serving as a platform for dialogue and integration between decision-makers and the private sector to achieve sustainable economic growth and job creation.

During the meeting, Mr. Abdullah Al-Jubouri delivered a brief presentation to the Korean delegation on the Council's mission, vision, and sectors. He noted that the Council includes prominent business leaders and well-established economic figures, in addition to strong government representation comprising advisors, deputy ministers, representatives of the National Investment Commission, the Central Bank of Iraq, state-owned banks, heads of major federations such as the Chambers of Commerce, Contractors, and Industries, as well as advisors to the Prime Minister for economic affairs. Accordingly, the Council represents the highest body representing the private sector in Iraq.



Mr. Al-Jubouri further emphasised that the Council's vision, approved by the Council and currently pending endorsement by the Council of Ministers under the (2026–2036) framework, represents a comprehensive guiding reference for government entities to regulate and direct economic policies and activities. He noted that the vision focuses on enhancing the private sector's performance and enabling it to fully contribute to driving the Iraqi economy, moving away from the current oil-dependent economic model. He stressed that the Council plays a central role in supporting efforts to expand trade exchange with countries worldwide, particularly the Republic of Korea.

He also highlighted that the Council helps mitigate the impact of certain regulatory decisions that may at times impose burdens on the private sector, noting that efforts are underway to revise such measures. He further expressed aspirations to amend the Commercial Agencies Law in favour of Iraqi partners and proposed organising an Iraqi-Korean business forum, either in Baghdad or in Korea, with the support of the Iraq-Korea Business Council, to bring together companies and business leaders from both countries.



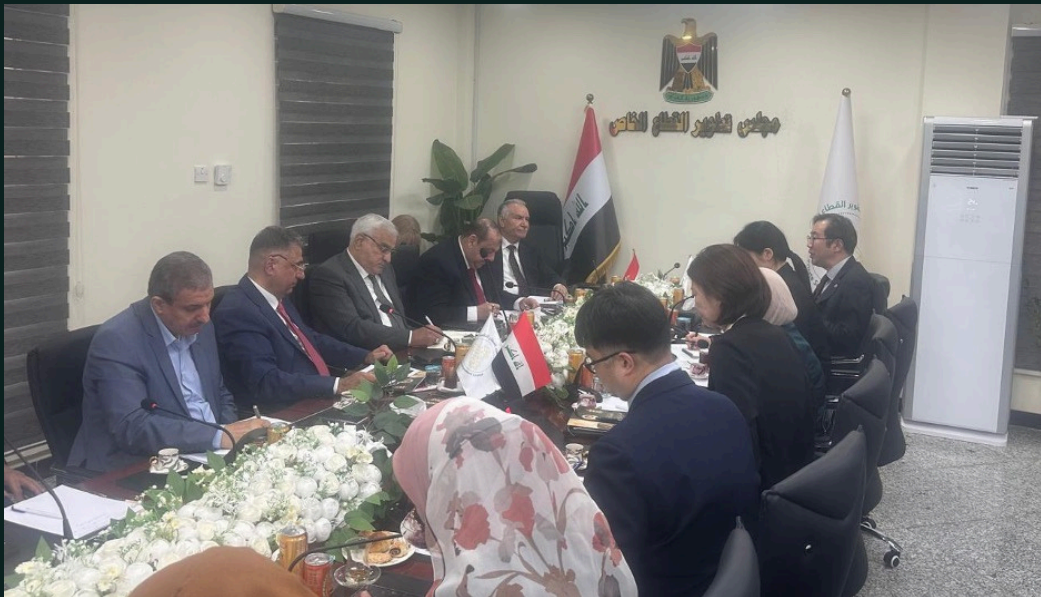
For his part, H.E. Ambassador Lee Jong-il reaffirmed the depth of the strategic partnership between Iraq and the Republic of Korea, noting that Korea represents an ideal partner for Iraq across various economic sectors. He highlighted the strong presence of major Korean companies operating in Iraq, including Daewoo, Hyundai, Hanwha, and Samsung, reflecting the level of mutual trust between the two sides.

He also pointed to promising opportunities for Iraq to diversify its economy, achieve sustainable growth, and reduce reliance on oil by strengthening the role of the private sector, advancing industrial development, and expanding trade exchange, including increasing imports of Korean products.



The Ambassador further referred to Korea’s development experience, noting that the country had previously faced similar challenges, including electricity shortages, but successfully overcame them through comprehensive reforms, particularly in tax policies and systems. He emphasised that Korea now possesses advanced expertise that could support Iraq’s economic reform efforts.

In his remarks, Mr Ahmed Shaban, Chairman of the Iraq-Korea Business Council, emphasised that cooperation between Iraq and the Republic of Korea is built on over two decades of successful, cumulative experience, contributing to major project implementation and strengthening mutual trust. He noted that this success encouraged the Iraqi government to enhance partnerships with the private sector and establish specialised business councils to promote trade and economic exchange.



He added that the Iraq-Korea Business Council was established pursuant to a ministerial order issued by the Iraqi Ministry of Trade, in accordance with the Iraqi Chambers of Commerce Law No. 43 of 1989 (as amended), making it an official economic entity within the formal institutional framework. The Council connects business communities in both countries, facilitates cooperation among companies, and provides direct channels to relevant government entities.

Mr. Shaban further noted that the Council witnessed significant activity over the past year, including a series of meetings in Iraq, as well as an official visit to the Republic of Korea at the end of last year to participate in “KORMARINE 2025” in Busan, one of the leading international maritime industry exhibitions. The Council had an active presence at the event, with Iraq represented by Al-Zaman Shipbuilding Company, contributing to enhancing partnership opportunities and showcasing Iraq’s investment potential.



With the support of the Korea Trade-Investment Promotion Agency (KOTRA), this participation resulted in tangible outcomes, including the recognition of the Iraq-Korea Business Council during the exhibition and the signing of several Memoranda of Understanding with reputable Korean companies, paving the way for their entry into the Iraqi market and investment in strategic sectors such as specialized marine industries, oil and gas, energy, healthcare, and other promising fields.

Mr Ahmed Shaban highlighted the upcoming Iraq-Korea Joint Committee meeting scheduled for June, noting that the Iraqi Ministry of Trade – Department of Foreign Economic Relations – has invited ministries and the Council to submit proposals for discussion. He confirmed that the Council has prepared a comprehensive work program to be presented during the meeting.



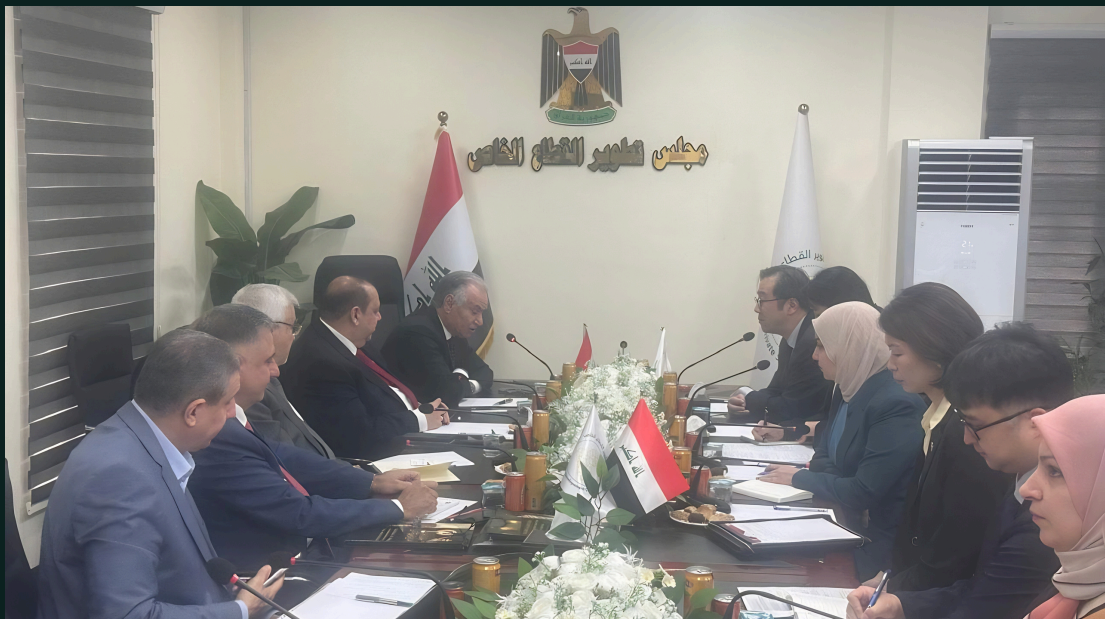
He explained that this meeting represents an important milestone for updating and reviewing the paths of cooperation between the two countries, with broad participation from Iraqi ministries and institutions. The meeting also included discussions on the memoranda of understanding that were previously addressed during the ninth session of the Iraqi-Korean Joint Committee meetings held in Seoul, the capital of South Korea, in June 2023.

At that time, the Iraqi side was represented by the Minister of Trade, alongside representatives from various ministries, while the Korean side was headed by the Minister of Land, Infrastructure and Transport. This reflects the high level of representation and the commitment of both sides to expanding their economic relations toward broader horizons.



Mr. Mohammed Sadiq Al-Her, Secretary-General of the Private Sector Development Council, highlighted the depth of relations with the Korean side and noted the Council’s intention to expand its international engagement, beginning with the Korean Embassy. He emphasised the Council’s openness to cooperation across all sectors, representing nineteen sectors and hundreds of leading business figures, and its readiness to enhance trade relations between the two countries.

He emphasised that the Private Sector Development Council has significant flexibility and openness to work across a range of fields, particularly given that it encompasses nineteen economic sectors and hundreds of prominent business leaders serve as active members across different specialisations. He also noted that the Council is fully prepared to open new horizons for cooperation that contribute to the development and strengthening of trade and economic relations between Iraq and the Republic of Korea, serving the mutual interests of both sides.



In his remarks, Mr. Baqir Al-Mashat, a member of the Private Sector Development Council, referred to the growing role of the private sector in Iraq, emphasising the importance of coordination with the commercial section of the Korean Embassy to prepare a list of Korean companies interested in entering the Iraqi market and building effective partnerships with the private sector across various sectors. He also pointed to the possibility of granting commercial agencies or moving toward manufacturing in Iraq in ways that facilitate the transfer of industries and technology and enhance local production capabilities.



Regarding the supportive government environment, he explained that the Iraqi government has issued sovereign guarantees to enable the private sector to establish strategic partnerships, develop the industrial sector, and stimulate productive projects. He noted that these guarantees create opportunities for cooperation with Korean banks to finance industrial projects, as well as the possibility of establishing correspondent banking relationships between Korean and Iraqi banks, thereby facilitating the opening of letters of credit and enhancing trade and investment flows between the two countries.

Mr. Haider Al-Rubaie, Chairman of the Iraqi-Chinese Friendship Association, emphasised the importance of enhancing cultural exchange between peoples, including increasing awareness of Korean culture.
